This program celebrates the achievements of water utilities that transform from the traditional wastewater treatment system to a resource recovery facility and leader in the overall sustainability and resilience of the communities they serve. The recognition program is a collaborative effort that includes the National Association of Clean Water Agencies, the Water Environment Federation, the Water Environment & Reuse Foundation, and the WateReuse Association with input from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Forty-three public and private utilities from across the U.S., Canada, and Europe were selected for recovering resources from wastewater, engaging with their community, forming unique partnerships, and building an internal culture of innovation.

OCSD is a public agency that provides wastewater collection, treatment, and recycling for approximately 2.6 million people in central and northwest Orange County. OCSD has two operating facilities that treat wastewater from residential, commercial and industrial sources.
