The Orange County Sanitation District Receives Award for its Outstanding Compliance Record

Fountain Valley, California – The Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD) has recently been selected to receive the Platinum Peak Performance Award from the National Association of Clean Water Agencies (NACWA). The Platinum Peak Performance Award honors facilities with a consistent record of full compliance for a consecutive five-year period. This is the first time OCSD has been recognized with this award.

"As the third largest wastewater treatment facility west of the Mississippi River, perfect compliance over a fiveyear period can be difficult. We received this award for our Reclamation Plant in Fountain Valley and Treatment Plant in Huntington Beach. Maintaining a perfect record of compliance for five years demonstrates the dedication of each of our employees to protecting public health and the environment," stated Jim Herberg, OCSD General Manager.

"It's an honor to be recognized by NACWA for 100 percent compliance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits. We take the safety and security of our facilities, staff and the community very seriously," stated Herberg.
