



Taft Avenue Sewer Improvement Project

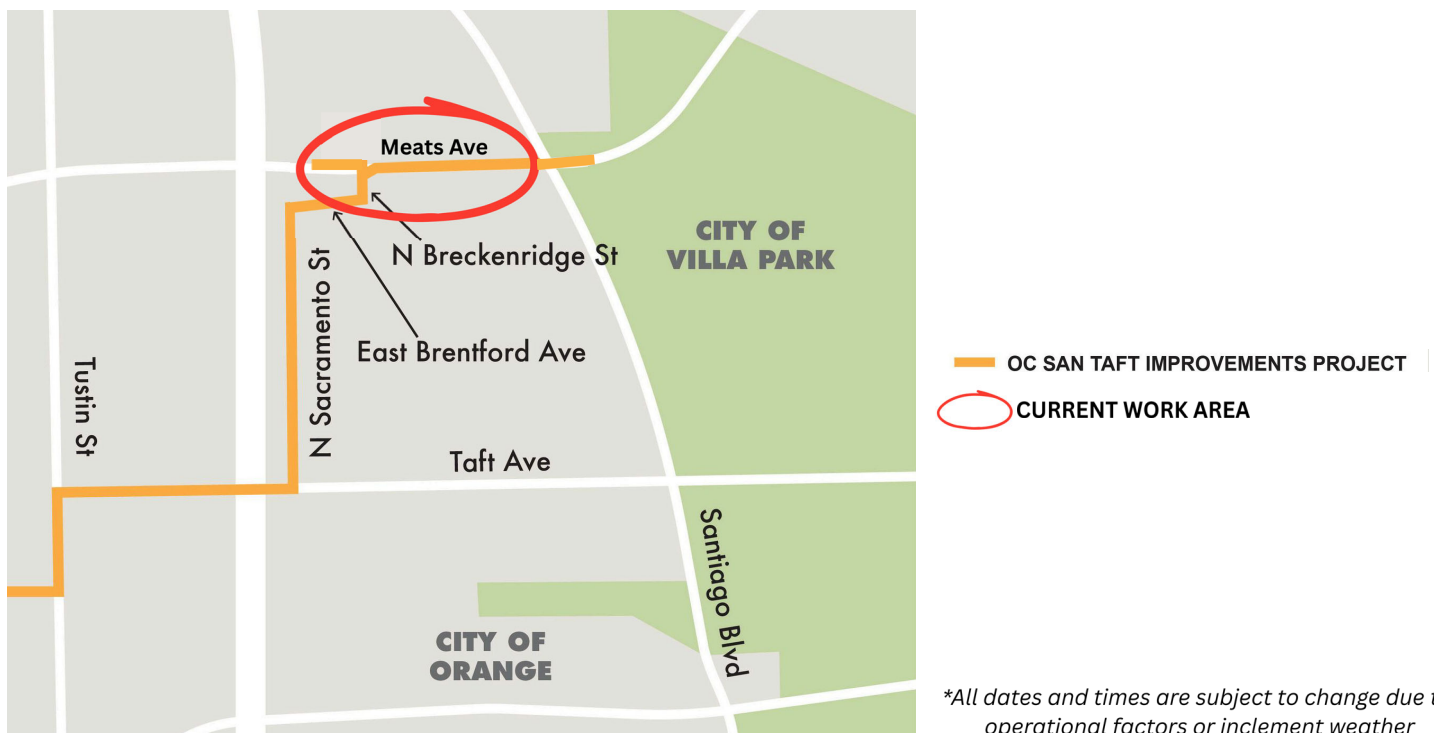
The **Taft Avenue Sewer Improvement Project** has been moving along the project alignment in the City of Orange. Construction has now reached the final segment of the project alignment on Meats Ave. Following pipeline installation, crews will return to complete final paving, striping, and other finishing work. Major construction is anticipated to be completed by the end of Fall 2026.*

Work Location: Meats Ave.

Temporary striping has been completed in preparation for construction on Meats Ave. Crews are onsite and will be rehabilitating existing manholes and installing a new sewer pipeline.

- **Where:** Meats Ave. from N. Pami Cir. to Santiago Blvd.
- **When:** Currently ongoing – Fall 2026*
- **Hours:** Monday- Friday, 8 a.m.– 5 p.m.*
- **Impacts:**
 - Permanent traffic control will be in place until work is completed. Please follow all posted signs.
 - Traffic lanes will be reduced to one lane going east and west during work hours.
 - Potential bus stop relocations. Visit www.octa.net for details.
 - Bike lanes may be impacted during construction.
 - Detours may be in place while work is happening

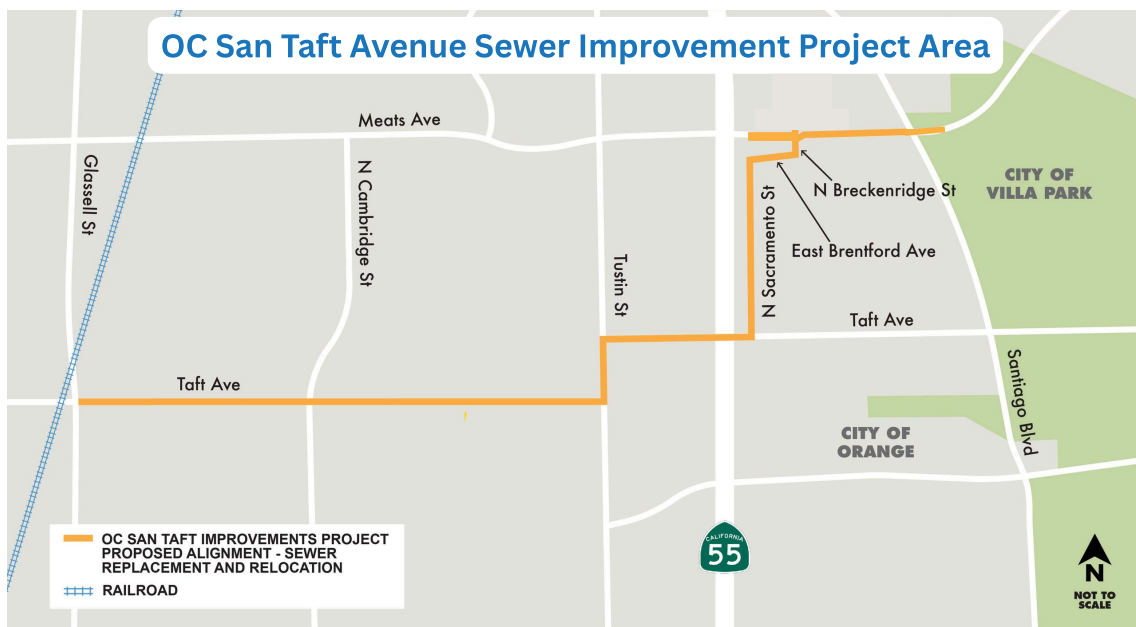
Orange County Sanitation District (**OC San**) provides wastewater collection, treatment and recycling services for approximately 2.6 million people in central and northwest Orange County. The OC San **Taft Avenue Sewer Improvement Project** is part of a large capital improvement program to maintain and improve regional sewer infrastructure.

About the Project

The project will replace and relocate a portion of the Taft Sewer in the City of Orange. The project will upsize almost two miles of pipe along Taft Avenue from Glassell Street to Sacramento Street, northbound on Sacramento Street to Brentford Avenue, to Breckenridge Street to Meats Avenue. The current pipe ranges between 12 to 15 inches and will be upsized to 18 to 21 inches. A portion of the sewer that currently runs along Tustin Street will be relocated to North Sacramento Street.

Why Is This Infrastructure Needed?

OC San is committed to protecting public health and the environment by proactively replacing and maintaining its infrastructure. Increasing the size of the pipe as part of the project increases flow capacity to accommodate peak wet weather events and will also facilitate the future maintenance of the pipeline.
